

Crisis and Renewal in Twentieth Century Banking

The Editors

Edwin Green was appointed as archivist at Midland Bank in 1974 and served as group archivist of HSBC from 1993 until his retirement in 2007. He has been a trustee of the Business Archives Council since 1975 and was also a founder member of the Academic Advisory Council of the *European Association for Banking and Financial History (EABH)* e.V. in 1990. His books include *Debtors to their Profession: The Institute of Bankers' 1879-1979* and *Banking: An Illustrated History* in 1989. More recently he was co-editor of the Association's publications *Crisis and Renewal in Twentieth Century Banking* in 2004 and *The Human Factor in Banking History* in 2008.

John Lampe is Professor of History and Chair of the Department of History at the University of Maryland, USA. His researches mostly focus on Balkan and Southeast-European economic history. His initial book was *Balkan Economic History, 1550-1950. From Imperial Borderlands to Developing Nations*, written in 1982 with Marvin Jackson, won the Vucinich Prize. As a former Foreign Service Officer, Professor Lampe directed the area studies program for Southeastern Europe at the Foreign Service Institute from 1980 to 1985 and the program in East European Studies at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington from 1987 to 1997. From 2006 until 2009 he was also a senior scholar at the Wilson Center. His last major publication was in 2006 *Balkans into Southeastern Europe: A Century of War and Transition*.

Franjo Štiblar is Professor at the Department of Law at the University of Ljubljana, Slovenia. Studying law and economics in Ljubljana and Belgrad, he became Phd in Economics at Pennsylvania University in 1977. Štiblar's research concentrates on e.g. economies in transition, banking and monetary policy, international trade and finance, institutional economics, macro econometric models and the Western Balkan region. Besides his participation in several international projects and occasions as visiting professor, he has been consultant to the World Bank in 1991/1992. His latest publications are *The Impact of Global Crisis on Montenegro and the Western Balkans, CCBM, Podgorica* in 2009, and *Ekonomске doktrine za vrijeme globalne krize u Crnoj Gori i na Zapadnom Balkanu, EF Podgorica* in 2010. Currently he is visiting professor at the University of Bologna
