Harold James is Professor of History at Princeton University and fellow at Historisches Kolleg, Munich. He holds a joint appointment as Professor of International Affairs in the Woodrow Wilson School, and focuses on economic and financial history and modern German history. He was educated at Cambridge University, received his PhD in 1982, and used to be a fellow of Peterhouse for eight years before coming to Princeton University in 1986. His books include a study of the interwar depression in Germany, *The German Slump*, published 1986, *A German Identity 1770-1990* in 1989 and *International Monetary Cooperation Since BrettonWoods* in 1996. He was co-author of *Die Deutsche Bank: 1870-1995*, published 1995, which won the Financial Times Global Business Book Award. Recent works are *The Roman Predicament: How the Rules of International Order Create the Politics of Empire* in 2006 and in 2009 *The Creation and Destruction of Value: The Globalization Cycle*. In 2004 he was awarded with the Helmut Schmidt Prize for Economic History.

Jakob Tanner is Professor of History at the University of Zurich and Historian of the Modern Era. The core theme of his research is social- and business history. From 2004 till 2009 he was a fellow at Collegium Helveticum. Jakob Tanner is co-editor of the scientific journals *Historische Anthropologie*, *Zeitschrift für Unternehmensgeschichte* and *Gesnerus - Schweizerische Zeitschrift für Geschichte der Medizin und der Naturwissenschaften*. He is President of Schweizerisches Sozialarchiv in Zurich, board member of Schweizerische Gesellschaft für Wirtschafts- und Sozialgeschichte, and advisory member of the research project *Geschichte der Deutschen Forschungsgemeinschaft*. His latest publication is *A Random Walk Down Wall Street? Industriemoderne und Finanzmarktkapitalismus* in: Martin Sabrow (ed.), *ZeitRäume* in 2010 (pp.169-184). Currently he is fellow at Freiburg Institute for Advanced Studies (FRIAS).
