

The Emergence of Modern Central Banking from 1918 to the Present

Carl-L. Holtfrerich is a Professor of Economics and Economic History who taught at the Free University of Berlin until 2007. In 2008 he became a member of the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Science. Together with his *EABH* colleagues Gerald D. Feldman and Harold James as well as Lothar Gall and Hans E. Büschgen he co-authored *Die Deutsche Bank: 1870-1995*, which received the Financial Times/Booz-Allen & Hamilton Global Business Book Award for being best business history worldwide. Holtfrerich had also been a well-respected member of *EABH's* Academic Advisory Council.

Jaime Reis is a researcher at the Institute of Social Sciences of the University of Lisbon. In addition to his MA in International Relations from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy in 1968, he obtained his PhD in History in 1975 from the University of Oxford. Furthermore, he holds the degree of "agregação" from the Faculdade de Economia of the Universidade Nova de Lisboa since 1984. He is a founder and former president of the European Historical Economics Society, from 1998 to 1999, as well as former member of the Committee of the International Association for Economic History from 1994 to 2002. He has worked on topics relating to agriculture, money and banking, labour and human capital, and the impact of institutions on economic growth.

Gianni Toniolo has been a Research Professor of Economics at Duke University since 1996. Additionally, he works as a research fellow in the Center for Economic Policy Research in London and teaches at the Libera Università delle Scienze Sociali in Roma. His teaching and research have focused on economic subjects, such as European and Italian economic growth from 1800 to 2000, central banking and financial markets. Being the editor of *Rivista di Storia Economica*, he is also looking back on various memberships of editorial boards for numerous journals around the world. From 1990 to 1999 he has served at *EABH's* Academic Advisory Council. The paperback edition of his most recent book *The Past and Future of Central Bank Cooperation (Studies in Macroeconomic History)*, edited in cooperation with Claudio Borio and Piet Clement in 2008, was only published in 2011.
